here were plagues, famines and wars all through human history, but the present pandemic COVID-19, is the greatest challenge across the world after World War II. According to one source, it has infected more than two million and led to the deaths of over 1,70,000 people. Not only precious human lives are lost, but the whole socio-economic fabric is torn asunder creating uncertainty and panic.

St Joseph's institutions, Bengaluru along with their staff and students, alumni and alumnae, benefactors and well-wishers, government and non-governmental agencies were able to supply about 76,500 food kits to the afflicted in Bengaluru urban and rural districts. Along with food, we also offered accompaniment with counselling. We have focussed primarily on the migrant workers, landless labourers and daily wage earners who are the hardest hit in India.

Incidentally, for most of us in India, COVID-19 made its entry during the holy season of Lent, when we, Christians, contemplate the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus. It is a time to die, rise with and raise like Jesus. It is a time to transcend suffering and pain and generate happiness. It is a time to join hands with God and people of goodwill. I thank all those who have joined hands with us. I invite all people of goodwill to

join hands with us and make a difference within and around us.





Bangalore Jesuit Educational Society

The Bangalore Jesuit Educational Society in collaboration with the NGOs Diyaghar, Hasiru Dala, OBA of SJBHS and alumni of XLRI and St Joseph's College is carrying out the COVID-19 relief work extensively in the urban as well as in rural areas of Bengaluru, reaching out to the poorest of the poor, the migrants, destitute homes, slum-dwellers, orphans, elderly people and widows.

The Society is galvanizing both human and financial resources to join hands with an alumnus of XLRI who took the lead to carry out the massive COVID-19 relief work. The students from the hostel, volunteers from the college vicinity, religious women from the neighbourhood and the Jesuits of the town have brought the yeomen force and strength to the re-



lief work. Every day the relief packages worth a thousand rupees are being distributed to the needy. A total of 75,000 kits have been distributed to 3,00,000 needy people as on April 20. The work is getting bigger and the cause is being witnessed by the government and the city police, including the Police Commissioner. The BJES extends its heartfelt gratitude to all who are contributing towards its fight against the COVID-19 pandemic.





Mangalore Jesuit Educational Society



St Aloysius College Community Radio Sarang has continued its 16 hours broadcast even during the lockdown. During this time, it has specifically focused on Corona related issues to create awareness among its listeners. Several doctors from the Wenlock hospital including the District incharge minister Mr Kota Srinivas Poojary came to the studio for live phone-in programmes. The Psychology Department of the college and the Listening Centre have jointly begun a helpline facility called Manottejaka for people to deal with stress. This was initiated in association with Prajna Counselling Centre, Mangaluru and Aadyaa Foundation, Bengaluru. Meanwhile, the cutting and sewing trade at SAITI is helping the district administration in preparing face masks. The Mangalore Jesuit Educational Society has taken a lead in providing the construction workers and other poor families with food grains. Nearly 3,000 families are being served in co-ordination with the Mangaluru City Corporation as well as the Labour Department. Provision kits are also distributed to over 200 families of our poor students.











St Joseph's Indian Institutions, Bengaluru

St Joseph's Indian Institutions, through the Centre for Social Concern have reached out to the migrant workers, the poor and the needy in and around the locality all through this period of unprecedented lockdown announced by the government due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The services extended during this critical period are as follows:

• Shelter for 120 migrant labour/construction workers since the lockdown has been announced.

• Food pack and groceries for 75 stranded construction workers from North India.

• Supply of ration to the families of economically weaker students of St Joseph's Indian Institutions.

• Online counselling service for the parents and students of SJII by the staff members of St Joseph's School CBSE.

• Supply of necessary provisions to the most neglected and abused community of the society, the transgender community housed at JD Mara Slum.

• Supply of essential ration to the needy Pourakarmika's of BBMP.

• *Masks to the construction* workers to help them *stay protected from the Corona infection.*

• Moral support to the Police personnel who are tirelessly working in managing the public movement on the roads during this quarantine period by providing them with snacks and tea at regular intervals.

• Supply of necessary ration to the homeless and other needy people from the Leprosy Colony, Muneshwara Layout, Chikkanayakanahalli and Sarjapur Main Road.

Loyola Institutions, Bannerghatta Road

Joyola Institutions are leaving no stone unturned while dealing with the threat of Corona virus. Self-isolation, hygiene, social and physical distancing at common meeting points are some of the measures taken to curtail the entry of corona into our campus! The Institutions have taken up the relief work for the daily wage labourers and migrant workers in the vicinity. The Jesuit community has extended its services in terms of providing meals to 148 people for 10 days on a daily basis, and



6,103 grocery kits to 26,384 daily wage workers, migrant labourers, construction site workers, poor families, stranded people, slum-dwellers, orphans, widows and sick people for 21 days.



Center for Non-Formal Education, Vijayapura



The district administration has recognised 10,000 families in Vijayapura district that are in crisis due to COVID-19. These families lack proper shelters and food. Most of these families are daily wage workers, families without permanent

jobs and slum-dwellers. Hence CNFE approached the DC to highlight the problems of slum-dwellers covered by the CNFE, Vijayapura. Immediately, he sanctioned milk packets to the families of the slums. The staff of CNFE along with the federation leaders distributed one litre of milk to each of the 5,000 families in 29



slums for 10 days. CNFE identified 500 most needy families of daily wage workers, senior citizens and widows and supplied provosion kits worth Rs 1,000 each, consisting of rice, dal, sugar, chilli powder, turmeric, dhaniya powder, oil, and salt.



Centre for Integral Rural Welfare, Anekal



nekal has been no exception to the great pandemic COVID-19. Centre for Integral Rural Welfare, Anekal in collaboration with St. Joseph's College Bengaluru reached out to the migrant labourers and the poor vil-

lagers in and around Anekal Taluk by distributing around 800 provision kits. The

Jesuits of Anekal Mission and the staff of CIRW were involved in surveying, packing and distributing the ration to the needy.



St Aloysius College, Harihar

ver 500 families of migrant labourers in Harihar and Davanagere towns who were stranded received food and provisions comprising rice 10kg, sugar 2kg, rava 2kg, oil 1 ltr, salt 1kg, chilli powder ½ kg, tea powder ½ kg, washing soap 2, tooth paste 1, beaten rice 2kg, jeera 100grm, sambar powder 250grm, turmeric powder 100grm, and a bathing soap from the management, staff and students of St Aloysius College, Harihar. There are many migrant families who have been given temporary shelter in tents on the outskirts of Harihar and Davanagere.

Loyola Vikas Kendra, Mundgod

Rollowing the crisis of the Corona Pandemic, Loyola Vikas Kendra, Mundgod conducted a survey to identify the most affected families which comprised migrants, widows, senior citizens, and differently-abled people. With the help of local ta-











luk administration, around 760 provision kits were distributed. Hand-made face masks prepared by the tailoring staff of LVK, hand sanitizers and other nec-

essary hygiene materials were dispensed to 1,300 families. The social centre has also

spread COVID-19 awareness through phone calls and local leaders in the villages.

Loyola Institutions, Pannur-Manvi

Though the district of Raichur falls under the green zone category of COVID-19 affected places, the residents of the vicinity have been much affected due to the lockdown effect as many are daily wage labourers. The Jesuits of Pannur-Manvi mission have risen to the call of this crisis in providing provision kits comprising rice 25 kg, dal 5 kg and oil 2 ltr to 1,000 families. The Loyola Health Centre located at Pannur is actively involved in spreading awareness about government welfare schemes, sanitization and hygiene methods and need for social distancing. The ambulance of the health centre is very much available for the needy.





St Joseph's Institutions, Hassan



S t Joseph's Institutions Hassan have sheltered 40 construction workers who were stranded due to the lockdown, and are helping them by providing provision kits and spreading awareness. Conducting a survey in collabo-

ration with the Holy Cross and Charity sisters, the Jesuits have also identified 80 de-

serving families from the SC/ST community who have been supported with provision kits.
