PROVINCIAL'S MUSINGS

We begin the Jubilee Year under the theme "Pilgrims of Hope." The Holy Year began officially with the opening of the Holy Door of St Peter's Basilica by Pope Francis on 24 December before the Christmas Eve Mass.

In May 2024, Pope Francis introduced the Jubilee Year 2025 with the Papal Bull Spes Non Confundit (translated as "Hope does not disappoint"), inspired by Romans 5:5. In the Bull, the Holy Father underlined that the coming Jubilee will "be a Holy Year marked by the hope that does not fade, our hope in God" and prayed that it may help us "to recover the confident trust that we require, in the Church and in society, in our interpersonal relationships, in international relations, and in our task of promoting the dignity of all persons and respect for God's gift of creation" (SNC No. 25).

We began the New Year 2025 and we are grateful to God for the gift of 'Time'. Margaret Silf in her book, *Inner Compass*, defines Time as "the duration between God's desires for me and my fulfilling it." It is not important how long we live but how fruitful we live in love and service, the deepest call of a human person.

Two of the great stalwarts of our province, Fr Devadatta Kamath and Fr Richard Sequeira, went to their eternal abode recently after completing 90 years of age. They contributed much to the history of the province and its archives. They were in true sense "men of magis". They were linguists, philosophers and historians who valued effort over outcome, shunned the limelight and accolades but relished intellectual rigour. They had a polite word for everyone and yet sharp in their critique when called for, threw no tantrums and didn't bruise the weakest reed or quench a flickering candle. It is their invincible spirit that will long endure in the province.

Workshop on the Archives in Jesuit History

The Xavier Centre of Historical Research (XCHR), Goa, in collaboration with the Archivum Romanum Societatis Iesu (ARSI), Rome, organized a workshop (December 14-15) titled "The Archives in Jesuit History." The event took place at the Xavier Retreat House, Baga, Goa. Representatives from various Jesuit provinces participated, including Fr Royston Pinto and Ms Alphonsa Ngoruh from the Karnataka Province.

The workshop featured the presentation of papers by renowned Jesuit archivists from India and abroad. Chief among them were: Rev. Dr Rinald Souza (Director of XCHR), Dr Dale Luis Menezes (formerly a researcher at Georgetown University), Fr Agnelo Mascarenhas (Provincial of Pune), Rev. Dr Festo Mkenda & Rev. Dr Raul

Gonsalez Bernardi (Academic & Administrative Directors respectively of ARSI), Rev. Dr Robert Danieluk (Pontifical Institute of Historical Studies in Warsaw) and Schol. Anthony Noronha. The Workshop proved to be an enriching and transformative experience for all participants.

Fr Royston Pinto and Ms Alphonsa Ngoruh presented an overview of the Archives of the Karnataka Jesuit Province. Their efforts were lauded by Rev. Dr Festo Mkenda and Rev. Dr Raúl González Bernardi. Kavyaraani (ACP of Sirsi Division). Over 700 participants from surrounding villages gathered together to engage in panel discussions with government officials, addressing crucial social issues. FR RICHARD SEQUEIRA, SJ (90/70) (12 MAY 1934 – 10 JAN 2025)

Dear Fathers, Brothers, Sisters, and family members of Fr. Richard, We have gathered today to bid farewell to Fr. Richard Sequeira, whose 90 years were filled with service, wisdom, and kindness, leaving behind countless cherished memories for all of us.

My first encounter with Fr. Richard goes back to April 1986, when I was a pre-novice preparing for my Four-Sheet exam. He was one of my four-sheet examiners. Almost 39 years have passed, yet his words of advice and guidance continue to echo in my mind. It was during this early meeting that I began to appreciate his humility and wisdom.

In 2007, when I served as the province treasurer, I had the privilege of living with Fr. Richard at Loyola Mandir. During those years, I came to know him not just as a spiritual guide but also as an academic mentor. I would often seek his help with the documents and letters I drafted, and he would go over them with an eagle's eye. His attention to detail was meticulous, ensuring that every word and phrase was just right. He took the time to explain not only the correction but also the reasoning behind it, making sure I understood the process.

I particularly recall one instance while working on my Ph.D. thesis, which included complex mathematical formulas. Fr. Richard, with his MSc in Mathematics, noticed an inconsistency. He gently pointed it out, saying, "Charlie, something is missing here," and explained the missing elements. He didn't just correct my work but helped me understand the problem in a clearer way. Fr. Richard never sought to impose his knowledge. Instead, he focused on empowering others to grow and learn.

In addition to his academic brilliance, Fr. Richard's spirituality was profound. His ability to communicate deep spiritual truths with simplicity was extraordinary. He never pushed his views onto others but allowed them to reflect and find their own insights. His teaching was not just intellectual—it was life-altering. His quiet humility and grace were a constant reminder of the essence of true spirituality.

There was an element to Fr. Richard's life that often reminded me of Dr. Manmohan Singh. I often thought of Fr. Richard as "Manmohan Singh without a turban." Like Dr. Singh, Fr. Richard had an innate ability to navigate complex situations with clarity, all while maintaining a humility that was deeply inspiring. He didn't seek accolades or attention but worked tirelessly behind the scenes, lifting others up with his wisdom and guidance.

Beyond his intellectual and spiritual depth, Fr. Richard's greatest quality was his boundless compassion. He was a man who truly listened. Whether offering spiritual direction, comforting the sick, or caring for the elderly at Pratiksha, he was always there. His empathy was remarkable, and he embodied the spirit of Christ, serving others without seeking recognition.

Even in his later years, when his body became frail, his spirit remained strong. He lived simply, with few material needs, and found joy in giving-of his time, wisdom, and love. His generosity knew no bounds, and he was always ready to lend a helping hand or a listening ear.

Fr. Richard's Jesuit life was a reflection of the Society's charism: deep prayer, intellectual rigor, and above all, a commitment to service. He served the Society in many roles: Socius to the Provincial, Province Archivist, Rector of St. Joseph's Seminary, and professor of philosophy, anthropology, and cosmology. His meticulous work as an Archivist preserved the history of the Karnataka Jesuits, ensuring that their legacy would be remembered for generations to come.

Throughout his life, Fr. Richard's focus was never on titles or accolades but on service. His legacy is built on his commitment to the mission entrusted to him, his deep humility, and his genuine desire to help people grow and flourish. Whether in his academic work, spiritual ministry, or personal relationships, Fr. Richard always sought to empower others.

Fr. Richard leaves behind a legacy of love, humility, and service. He was not only a priest, teacher, and scholar but also a friend, mentor, and guiding light. His life was a living example of Jesuit values—always giving, always serving, and always leading by example.

We will miss Fr. Richard dearly. His gentle spirit, wisdom, kindness, and unwavering dedication will never be forgotten. His impact on our lives is immeasurable, and his legacy will continue to inspire us.

Fr. Richard, may you rest in the peace of the Lord, surrounded by His love and grace, as you take your place among the saints. Amen.

DOWN MEMORY LANE

Fr Julian Fernandes SJ

Whenever I am asked to share something personal, I sense an instinctive reluctance to open the door to that private space. I myself often seem to encounter there a stranger in the mirror. For what it is worth, here is a brief corner-peep into this mirror.

Among the innumerable, often unknown influences that have shaped me, the years I lived at home have a foundational significance. My parents' and siblings' deep Christian faith and trust in God, nourished by the daily rosary, the weekly Eucharist and devotions in the parish. A family atmosphere of love and caring, of contentment with a simple life, no luxuries. Treated as a bright lad, I was allowed undue privileges and



freedoms which, in retrospect now I deeply regret. As an altar boy, not overly pious, I attended the week-day Masses only when I was marked to serve, not regularly.

Don Bosco Primary and St Mary's High School, Shirva, offered me plenty of opportunities for leader-ship: class leader, debating society secretary, main part in annual drama, on the stage for public functions. The headmaster, appointed just after graduating from St Aloysius' College and a year of B.T., ran the school in a climate of broad all-round education modelled on the Jesuit ideal of liberal humanism he had assimilated at St Aloysius'. Our teachers, most of them Hindus, were truly inspiring models for us and we respected them. Those were the days of heady dreams for a newly independent India. We hero-worshipped Gandhi, Nehru, Patel.... In the final year farewell class photo I wasthe only one who wore the Gandhi topi. Unlike today, politics was a clean and attractive option, call to build a new democratic India

Why, therefore, I did not join politics and why God called me to the SJ, I have no idea. I did not know any Jesuit, and had only vaguely heard about them. In March 1955 I completed high school final exam (VI Form = Class 11) and was waiting for results. In early May vocation promoter Fr Denis Pinto SJ visited Shirva and asked the parish priest about possible candidates. I was called to meet him. In a brief

two-minute conversation I told him I had no plan to join the Jesuits. That was that and hewent away. Years later, when I was at Mount St Joseph on visitation, Fr Denis told me that the moment he saw me he was absolutely sure I was going to be a Jesuit!

My elder brother working in Bombay and closely associated with the Jesuits in CLC, on his home holiday that month, heard about my meeting with Fr Denis and spoke well of the Jesuits and encouraged me to reflect on the option. Tentatively I went to Fr Denis at St Aloysius' with my SSLC results, planning to get admission to Intermediate as a possible candidate. He took my marks sheet to Fr Boniface D'Souza, Superior of the Mangalore-Calicut Mission headquartered there. I was called upstairs to meet him. *This village boy is going to be sent back home*, I thought, and nervously went up. He looked at my marks, raised his eyes to me, a light smile lit up his face. "Would you like to join the novitiate now?" Shocked, I asked, "Can I join NOW?" "You may, if you wish." "Yes, Father, ready!" Where this unprepared answer came from, without even the consent of my parents, is a mystery. My 18th year was six months away. *The awful daring of a moment's surrender which an age of prudence can never retract!* (T.S. Eliot). So there I was, on 1st July 1955, on the train to Calicut with other novices-to-be.

Eighteen years of rigorous Jesuit formation. Calicut, Shembag, Trichy, Innsbruck, Paris. At each phase the challenge of adapting to a different culture and mastering a new language. The joy of rubbing shoulders with companions from a wide diversity of ethnic, cultural, linguistic and national backgrounds and establishing strong bonds of friendship with men and women across the globe. The first thirteen years in the classical, pre-Vatican near-monastic mould. The next five in the excitement of the liberal Vatican-II spirit, the thrill and inevitable confusion of questioning everything, letting go of past certainties, discarding rigid structures and moving on seeking freshness of the Spirit. A thrilling adventure, this kaleidoscopic memory! This latter phase of formation – questioning, searching, seeking freshness – set the pattern of my way proceeding for the rest of my life's journey.

College teaching, my first ministry after formation, lasted just seven years, the last two of these as principal of St Joseph's College, Bangalore (a year and half), and of St Aloysius College, Mangalore (six months). Students' protests erupting in France in the 1960s had spread all over the world and reached India in the '70s. Frustrated youth were protesting against widespread corruption, injustice, poverty and unemployment. Youth work was joyful as well as challenging.

When Arrupe appointed me provincial of Karnataka in 1980, the Province seemed to be in desolation, feeling stuck on the 'Mangalore-Bangalore axis', vocations were a trickle. In my first year I listened to and prayed over the frustrations and the best desires of our men, and in the 1981 Province Sammelan I articulated a vision of giving priority to vocation promotion, deeper insertion in Kannada culture and moving to North Karnataka. The province, experiencing consolation, responded enthusiastically. Several bright brave men volunteered and were given all the freedom they sought to realize that vision, making mistakes, changing strategies, the dream taking shape in the process. The fruit is there for all to see. Not my merit. Led by the Spirit, these courageous pioneers, despite limited material resources, creatively faced enormous challenges in the North Karnataka outreach and Nagaland Mission, and rejuvenated the province.

The twenty-five years spent in Jesuit governance – Loyola Mandir, Jor Bagh, Rome – came as a surprise at each stage. But I am grateful for the grace of getting a deeper understanding of Ignatian-Jesuit way of proceeding, a more intimate knowledge the Society worldwide and a glimpse of the inspiring spirit of Arrupe and Kolvenbach. The account of conscience and confidentiality, the DNA of Jesuit governance, had to be safeguarded when some of my actions and decisions provoked criticism I could not counter. I had the joy of being involved in the preparation of GC-33 and GC-34 and of participating in both. Other experiences while in Rome that I specially treasure: organizing and conducting the colloquium of new provincials in different languages, and facilitating the general chapters of other religious congregations of men and women. Some of these congregations invited me to guide their general councils and renewal programmes.

As elected assistens ad providentiam, I would have had stayed in office till the next General Congregation. Pope John-Paul II refused Fr Kolvenbach permission to call a GC and submit his resignation. With no prospect of a GC in the near future, and feeling stale in the last few of the 13 years I spent in Rome, in 2005 I successfully begged to be relieved and returned to Kohima Region, to which I had been ascribed when it was created in 1995.

For nearly 20 years now, except for three years as rector and parish priest of Jakhama, I have been engaged in spiritual ministry: directing retreats, facilitating provincial and general chapters. I was called to organize and conduct the Spiritual Animation

Process of the South Asian Jesuit provinces, as a foundation for the restructuring of governance, mandated by GC-35. Hands-on experience, learning by doing, is the only training I had for most of the tasks I have handled all these years. Whatever has been accomplished is a gratuitous grace, far beyond my own capacity or planning.

Now in my 87th year God has given me enough work to do and sufficient health to do it, while intimations of mortality are not wanting. Of the seven Karnatakans who joined in 1955 only Ozzie Mascarenhas and I are still living. Plenty to do as long as the Lord keeps me here on earth, heaven can wait. I am still questioning, learning, letting go of securities and certainties, to seek freshness of the Spirit for those I guide as well as for myself.
