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PROVINCIAL'S MUSINGS

he Provincials and Regional Superiors of the Jesuit Conference of South Asia (JCSA) gathered for their annual meeting at De Nobili College, Pune from 22-27 October 2023. During the first three days, we had a very fruitful apostolic discernment in common, regarding 'Reimagining and Restructuring the Society of Jesus in South Asia'.

Fr General's talk on "Restructuring" delivered to the JCSA at XLRI, Jamshedpur in February 2023 is very insightful. He says, "While restructuring is more than merging, splitting, reshaping boundaries etc., it does not exclude these. The purpose, ultimately, is how to better serve the mission of the Church in South Asia today and how to do so in a way that we are able to economize on and better utilize our personnel and finances.

There are movements in some of the units of South Asia to expand existing works and start new ones. While this may be needed, these need to be well discerned in the wider context of South Asia and not only in within the narrow confines of your provinces and regions. On the other hand, there have been and always will be SEVERAL and IMPORTANT NEEDS. On the other hand, can we, should we and are we called to meet ALL THE NEEDS THAT ARISE? If we have surplus competent Jesuits in a particular field, can we share them with other units in the Conference that have a dearth of these? There needs to be much more inter-provincial sharing of personnel, personnel that are competent and wanted and not personnel that we would better do without." (JCSA, JAM, February 2023).

As the fruit of the deliberations of Reimagining and Restructuring of the Society in South Asia, the Major Superiors chose the following preferences to make our life-mission more fruitful:

- to increase spiritual and intellectual depth among us
- to form mission-driven communities
- to rebalance the apostolic efforts and to clarify what ministries to be retained or reformed, to be closed or to be transferred
- to intensify collaboration with the laity and the religious, inside and outside the province/region
- to foster interprovincial collaboration in formation and other areas
- to focus on project-based collaboration with other provinces and regions especially on burning issues
- to create new provinces from the several existing provinces/regions.

Meeting of Local Superiors, CCMs and DoWs at Prerana, MSJ, Bengaluru 😤 😅

he local Superiors, Commission for Choice of Ministries and directors of work (DOWs) came together to reflect and deliberate on the theme 'Leadership for mission-driven teams' at Prerana, Mount St Joseph, Bengaluru on November 11-12. There were over 75 participants. The keynote speaker was Anand Nayak, former HR, ITC and presently the HR Manager at St Joseph's University, Bengaluru. In his two-part address, Mr Nayak enumerated what it is to be a leader in a challenging modern world. He said: "A true leader is one who is true to oneself, transparent, living one's values, dependable, person of his word, one who walks the talk and one who does not speak ill of others in their absence." He added that personal trustworthiness is the foundation

of a high trust culture. "A leader leads himself to lead others. It is important that we increase the domain of our shared self, so that we become more open and proactive," he said. Mr Nayak

also asserted that revisiting paradigms can result in quantum leaps in outcomes. "It is important that we make our so called adversaries in our organisation as our



partners or collaborators, rather than making them our enemies. For this, we must listen with an intent to understand. We must always see what could be the third alternative, particularly in times of conflicts," he opined.

Fr Dionysius Vaz, the Provincial, in his address called upon the Jesuit leaders to have mission-driven teams rather than activity-driven or report-driven teams. "The primary role of a superior is to seek and discern the will of God. Further, his duty is cura personalis. It is important for superiors and DOWs to balance between administration and animation," he said. There was also a discussion and discernment on starting a CBSE school at Harihar. Fr Sunil Fernandes coordinated the two-day programme. The Province is grateful to the Rector and the community of MSJ and Prerana for hosting this memorable two day meeting.

INNSBRUCK, Austria

his December marks the completion of my third year in Innsbruck, Austria, where 1 came to pursue a Ph.D. in Ecology at the University of Innsbruck. I have had a rich learning experience living in the Jesuit community of Innsbruck, which comprises over 40 Jesuits, many of whom are retired professors from the faculty of theology and philosophy. The community is also involved in various ministries, including a Jesuit Church, Youth centre, Canisianum (an international house for diocesan and other religious priests studying Ph.D.), and the Jesuit Novitiate. Among the nine Jesuit students here, six of us are from India. I have received invaluable support from Bala Kiran, who played a crucial role in helping me acclimate to this place. His unwavering dedication



to his academic pursuits and his ability to forge strong interpersonal connections with the local

community, complemented by his mastery of the German language, has left a lasting impression on the Jesuits here. In recognition of his commitment, the Provincial of the Central European Jesuit (ECE) province personally invited him to join the Novitiate community to contribute to the development of young Jesuits, a role he wholeheartedly embraced. Currently, he is in Portland, pursuing his tertianship.

My academic studies at the University are conducted in English. The University of Innsbruck, a state-run institution with 16 faculties and a diverse international student body, has been a remarkable place for my research. While the University's history is tied to the Jesuit school founded by Peter Canisius, Jesuits are now primarily associated with the faculty of Philosophy and Theology.

To date, I have successfully concluded the data collection phase of my experiments, with 50% of the data analysed. Furthermore, I have completed the initial draft of my forthcoming research article. My research is supervised by Prof. Michael Bahn, a distinguished scientist in the field of Ecology. Within our team, we comprise a total of seven Ph.D. students and two post-doctoral researchers. The diversity in our national backgrounds not only contributes significantly to our group's scientific dynamism but also enhances our collective cultural enrichenrichment. In my research, I explore the effects of future climate conditions on plant phenology, studying how climate change, specifically rising temperatures, increased CO2 levels, and drought impact on the timing of various life stages in plants, from spring to autumn. These changes have far-reaching consequences for ecosystems and even human populations that rely on these plants for their survival.

I have had the opportunity to present my research at international conferences, expanding my network and collaboration opportunities in the field of ecology. The Jesuit community, particularly the Rector, has been instrumental in supporting my academic endeavours, and I have been fortunate to receive a scholarship from the University. This scholarship aids me to visit and learn from other research labs in Europe. I also had opportunities to foster connections with like-minded Jesuits working in ecology in Europe.

In the coming months, I look forward to visiting more labs in Europe, attending conferences, and gradually compiling my work for my thesis as I prepare for the doctoral defence in the years to come. - Fr Lumnesh Swaroop Kumar

"Who are we?" or "Who are we, the Jesuits?" "Who are these other people called to contribute to the mission that is under the responsibility of the Society of Jesus?" The experience we have had in this time has led us once again to place at the center of our identity, the person of Jesus, poor and humble. And I think it's always been there. When we reread the texts, both ancient and from recent Congregations after the Second Vatican Council, and we wonder about our identity, the Society always references Jesus Christ. We call ourselves the Society of Jesus. Maybe now we can insist more on what Ignatius constantly repeats in his Spiritual Exercises: "We follow Jesus poor and humble." That combination of Jesus who empties himself, detaches, becomes poor to enrich and therefore humiliates himself – He becomes humble, a servant of us, like one of many, is the figure that inspires at this moment the answer to the question about our identity. Our identity, we can only understand it from below. We can understand it only when we recognize that we need to be forgiven. Remember Congregation 32 when it defined what a Jesuit is? "We are forgiven sinners called to serve the Lord." Our identity is not invented by us, it is something we receive. It is a gift. It is a charisma. Not for us but for the Society, for the Church and for the world. The charisms, as explained by Saint Paul, are as way to serve. It is a gift from the Lord, a special grace so that the body of the Church can better serve the mission in the world. That is why we have to open our eyes to reality and listen intently to what the Church asks of us.
